FAMILY by Don Wicks

Who we are fades into the shadows of ancestral memories, forgotten in time, unless a caring soul or relative intervenes. Many lucky families have what they call their family historian who documents the family tree and its associated histories. For some, large volumes are produced, even newsletters, but for most of us the records are meager, if any at all. Of course, lore sometimes passes down, but it too it also dies with time. The famous have their successes (or failures) chronicled in the media, but even those narratives often leave out the personal stories and as time passes, even those records are not easily retrieved. Don't we all deserve something more than a piece of granite and a small plot of ground to remember us by?

Part of the problem is that we often wait until late in life to consider our own legacy, much less, those of our parents and siblings and other relatives and regret sets in. Wouldn't it be great if we could foster interest in our young to take an interest in and therefore chronicle their family's history and their own? This would take an effort by us, our schools and the general public to instill in them the dedication and respect needed for such an important undertaking. Those of us who are committed should strongly consider this and make an effort to foster this idea. If we don't do it, who will, and if we don't it's business as usual.

Some have caught up on family research soon enough, and for a few, God Bless them, they start at an early age. Hilda Lou Formby Hoffmann was one of those. Lore has it that as a teen, while

documenting her Stockstill ancestors at the Stockstill Cemetery, she looked around at all the other graves and wondered: "Who are those people," and began a lifelong search for answers.

After graduating from High School Hilda worked at local businesses until WWII.

she went to work for a shipbuilder in Pascagoula, MS. Actually, she was a courier for the Navy, employed on what today we call the Secret Service. One story she told was that before boarding a ship on a ladder wearing a skirt with men following her, she hesitated thought a minute and then murmured to herself "For God and Country" and proceeded on. She was in New Orleans when a German U-Boat was sunk. While going to work one day the Bay St Louis Bridge was blockaded. No one was allowed to drive or walk across it. She talked the soldiers into pushing her car across the bridge in her car so she could go to work.

She described herself to one Picayune resident as a "flaming redhead with a body to die for," which probably helped in convincing the soldiers.

Once she said she had to play the role of a prostitute and another time she met Winston Churchill in Canada. (If you have any other stories about Hilda, please forward them to us.

Hilda met her husband Emile James Hoffmann while working for the Navy and after the war she continued her search for family histories, her own and many others in the community and beyond. She died on July 4^{th} , 2010.

As her legacy she left behind over 200 boxes of binders plus five file cabinets full of genealogical and historical information about her family and thousands of her neighbors.

Her collection resides with us at the Hilda Hoffmann Memorial Archive Inc. and is open for business Monday thru Friday, 10am – 3pm at 301 Williams Ave., Picayune, MS 39466 (across from the new City Hall), 601-799-5671.

We are a non-profit organization and rely on membership dues and donations to pay our monthly bills. 


They said they were working with their dedicated partner, FamilySearch.org, to make these new records easily searchable online.

The Extinction of Some Given Names?

Names including Gertrude, Bertha, Willie and Cecil are at risk of dying out, while others such as Cyril and Mildred are becoming less popular, a new study has revealed.

An analysis of millions of birth records from 1905 revealed that some forenames have virtually disappeared, with many others being increasingly ignored.

The report by family history website Ancestry.co.uk showed the most "endangered" names included Gertrude, Bertha and Blodwen for girls and Willie, Cecil and Rowland for boys.

Norman, Horace, Leslie, Doris, Hilda and Edna were among the most popular names in 1905, but have become much less popular over the years, said the report. (source: The Genealogy News – Weekly Edition)

"JUNE SPOTLIGHT" HELEN CLUNIE

A native of Pearl River County, Mississippi, and a 1946 graduate of Pearl River Community College.

Twenty years later, she began teaching on a permit in Hancock County at Charles B. Murphy Elementary School. During her tenure there, she received the honor as one of the "Outstanding Elementary Teachers" of America and also the "Teacher of the Year" in Hancock County. In 1968, taking night classes at William Carey College and in 1973 received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Elementary Education.

Entering the graduate program of USM, she received her Master of Science Degree in Elementary Education in 1975, and began

teaching in 1978 at Pearl River Elementary School and retired from teaching in 1992.

Helen & husband, Bob Clunie served twelve years as hospice volunteers & completed training and became ordained Stephens Ministers.

Helen's list of achievements and memberships in DAR and various clubs & organizations are numerous.

Her ancestry includes her great, great grandfather Poplar Jim Smith, whom the town of Poplarville was named, she's also descended from Moses Strahan a Revolutionary War patriot, two Civil War veterans, Ebenezer Stewart & Carlos Alexander, and she has Native American roots where she is a member of the Four Winds Tribe, Cherokee Nation, DeRidder, LA.

After the death of friend, Hilda Hoffmann, she was asked to help in the preservation of Hilda's lifelong collection of genealogical and historical records. The vast collection of material was stored in a climate controlled facility. Almost a year later a repository was found and Helen purchased the home on Williams Ave., and renovations started. All the material was moved to the Williams Avenue location. Helen has not faltered either in her enthusiasm nor interest, she is always available.
