

"ARCHIVE NEWS"



Every season has a beauty of it's Own. Spring has budding blossoms on green plants recently broken through the soil. Winter has the stunning white of fresh fallen snow. Summer reveals the sky blue and emerald green of inviting swim spots. But nothing can match or surpass the parade of colors that Autumn features in its timber. This season of change and color has a spectrum that even challenges a rainbow.

When they see a tall, strong tree's leaves crinkle and descend to the ground many youngsters fear they are losing their favorite shady spots that protect them against summer's sun. However, as the seasons change, the ears of the shade seeking youngsters are alleviated as the following spring's budding begins.

So then the question Why do leaves fall?' sets into young inquisitive minds.

As reported at sciencemadesimple. com/plants-in-winter it is all part of Nature's orchestration. In the scientific circles the process is referred to as photosynthesis and there is a simple way to explain it.

Autumn are called 'deciduous'. As it is stated in northernwoodlands.org/articles, "Deciduous leaf fall is considered an adaptation that evolved to allow trees in seasonally changing environments to reduce water loss and frost damage during unfavorable seasons while increasing their photosynthetic efficiency during favorable seasons."

During the summer season when water and nutrients are readily available, deciduous trees produce glucose through their leaves. The tree takes in and stores the supplies at the base of the leaves called the "abscission" or "separation" layer. During the other seasons, food is carried to the tree and water is brought to the leaves by tiny tubes that convey this interaction of the leaves and the limbs through the abscission layer.

During autumn each tree begins preparing for the harsh winter to come when water and light will be harder to obtain. The abscission cells have the root word 'scissors' in the name because they are designed by Nature to cut off the flow between the timber and the foliage. Once

the layer of abscission cells receives the leaf-dropping hormone from the hard wood of the tree, the layer begins to swell to form a cork-like stopper which cuts off the flow between the leaves and the tree.


In an NPR.org/templates/story, Peter Raven, president of the Missouri Botantical Garden and renowned botanist, said, "This is how the season got its name 'Fall'. Though Doctor Raven wittily remarked, "It should be called the 'Get Off Me' season."

The hardening of the separation cells traps glucose and waste products in the leaves. It also stops the flow of fresh water to the leaves so they slowly begin to die.

Chlorophyll, which comes from light and gives leaves their varied shades of green color, helps plants use water and carbon dioxide to produce oxygen and glucose. That process is called photosynthesis which means "putting together with light".

However, getting trapped in the leaves by the separation layer, the chlorophyll dies. The underlying shade of red, orange, yellow, and brown which is overshadowed by the green, become evident as the leaves dry out and begin to drop. The colors that come from antioxidants in plants are natural parts of leaves, Hence we get "The Colorful Coats of Fall".

Mike Fitzwilliam, joined with more than a dozen interested participants to delve into the complex but rewarding venture to uncover our family histories using Ancestry and Family Search.




Mike also told some interesting stories about discoveries, both good and bad in his quest, including his trip to Ireland and his own family reunion.


